# Land Acknowledgement

We acknowledge that we are on the traditional territory of many nations including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishinaabe, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee and the Wendat peoples and is now home to many diverse First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. We also acknowledge that Toronto is covered by Treaty 13 signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit, and the Williams Treaties signed with multiple Mississaugas and Chippewa bands. This land is also governed by the dish with one spoon wampum belt convenient: an agreement between allied First Nations to peaceable share and care for the land around the Great Lakes.

The City of Toronto has been acknowledging the traditional territory since March 2014. Due to conversations with Indigenous leaders, including the Aboriginal Advisory Committee as part of the 2018 Toronto for All Campaign, the language the City of Toronto uses has evolved.

# What is food insecurity?

- State of being in which there is a lack of, or no, reliable access to affordable, healthy food
- A CBC article posted on August 17, 2022, reported that approximately 5.8 million Canadians experienced food insecurity in 2021



### How are we affected?

- In Ontario alone, it is reported that 1 in 6 households (16.1% or 2.3 million people) were food insecure in the last year
- Approximately 4.6% of households saw severe food insecurity, resulting in the missing of meals and heavily reduced food intake

### How are we affected?

- Researchers at the University of Toronto have found that food insecurity rates in Canada haven't changed over the last 3 years
- The pandemic only added to the already high rates of food insecurity
- Food costs continue to rise and there is inadequate social support

- ODSP Ontario Disability Support Program
- Open your internet browser and search by typing in "ODSP" into the search bar
- Left-click the <u>www.Ontario.ca</u> link – this should be the first search result at the top

- ODSP provides many health and disability-related support benefits
- These benefits can help you with different types of costs, including health, dental, vision, assistive devices, and other expenses related to disability or medical conditions



- Scroll down and click the "eligibility" text highlighted in blue
- You can click on any of the other text highlighted in blue to find out more information about each topic
- A small summary of each title is provided below the links

### <u>Eligibility</u>

Your eligibility for ODSP depends on medical and financial circumstances. Find out what information we look at when deciding your eligibility, and how much you can earn and keep in assets while being on ODSP. Learn how these affect your income support and eligibility on ODSP.

### Health and disability benefits

See what help is available for health, dental, vision, and disability-related costs, for you and your family.

#### **Employment supports**

Find out how you can get help finding a job or advance your career if you have a disability, through ODSP employment supports. You don't have to be on ODSP to apply.

### Income support for you and your family

If you are eligible to receive income support through ODSP, you receive a monthly payment.

Learn about how your living situation affects the amounts you receive.

### <u>Learn your rights and</u> <u>responsibilities</u>

You have rights and responsibilities while on ODSP. Knowing what to expect and what you need to do under the program will help ensure that you get the support you are entitled to.

### Ontario Disability Support Program eligibility for income support

Learn about the financial and medical information we use to determine if you are eligible for the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP), and what information you need to provide.



- This page shows you a small checklist of what allows someone to qualify for ODSP
- If you find that you qualify, you can return to the application page and click the "apply for ODSP" button

### Eligibility as a person with a disability

To be eligible for ODSP as a person with disability you must meet the definition of disability under the *Ontario Disability Support Program Act*.

Being a person with a disability means:.

- you have a substantial mental or physical impairment that is continuous or recurrent, and is expected to last one year or more
- the direct and cumulative effect of your impairment results in a substantial restriction in your ability to work, care for yourself, or take part in community life
- your impairment, its likely duration and restrictions have been verified by an approved health care professional

When you apply for ODSP, your caseworker will give you a Disability Determination Package for you and your health care professional(s) to complete.

You have 90 days to complete and return the package to the ministry's Disability Adjudication Unit. If you don't send it back within 90 days, we will consider your ODSP application withdrawn unless you make a written request for an extension and we approve it.

We will review your completed package to determine if you meet the program's definition of a person with a disability. This is called the Disability Determination Process.

If you meet the definition of a person with a disability, your local ODSP office will confirm that you still qualify financially. If you still qualify, you will receive income support.

If your disability or medical condition may improve, we will also give you a date for a medical review.

### 60 to 64 Year Olds

#### Background

Under the Ontario Works Act and Regulations, eligibility is now based on the client's ability to meet program requirements in accordance with the reason for assistance.

#### Intent

In developing the appropriate service plan, and in completing the Participation Agreement with this age group, the focus should be on jointly determining a plan which will best meet the needs and capabilities of this client group. Community Placement (CP) activities may be options most suited to this client group.

#### Administrative Guidelines and Procedures

At Participation Agreement Reviews (PAR) caseworkers are to assess each case on an individual basis. The individual's circumstances will assist in the determination of their participation in the various Ontario Works components. In the development of a mutually agreed-upon service plan, caseworkers are to be flexible, supportive and understanding of each client's different needs. Factors to consider in the development of the service plan may be the client's:

- age
- physical limitations
- emotional problems
- language
- education
- technology:
  - comfort level and familiarity
  - access
  - knowledge of various applications iob search strategies

### Assistance Through Ontario Works

If you do not have enough money for food and housing and are in financial need, you can apply for Ontario Works assistance online.

Apply Online

You can also apply by calling 416-338-8888.

Ontario Works provides money for food, shelter and other costs to people in financial need who meet the eligibility criteria.

Financial Assistance may include money for food, shelter, clothing and other household costs, the cost of prescription medications, and other help with health costs.

Toronto delivers this provincial social assistance program according to the **Ontario Works Act**<sup>2</sup>. Les services sociaux et d'emploi de Toronto (Toronto Employment & Social Services) offrent des **services en français**.

To apply by phone, call the Toronto Application and Support Centre at 416-338-8888 and select option 3 or call our tollfree number at 1-888-465-4478. This line is open Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and closed on weekends and public holidays. The call takes about 45 minutes.
